

2004-05 Undergraduate Application: Changes

This document represents the changes to the undergraduate application made by the Office of Undergraduate Admissions for the application year 2004-2005. The changes are based on extensive research and feedback from stakeholders in the application process. Our process for eliciting the feedback was as follows.

Round table meetings were held with the OUA assistant directors, counselors and processing staff, at which feedback was sought on each part of the application. We specifically focused on the efficacy of the application as a data collection instrument and its ability to elicit consistent responses from applicants (in other words, that each applicant interpreted each question in the same way). Processing staff also met separately and documented the parts of the application that caused problems in processing (for example, a number of applicants submitted the incorrect processing fee, resulting in a delay in the review of their applications). Readers—many of whom

are former secondary education professionals—also met separately and documented their recommendations. OUA office staff were encouraged to submit their observations on the application by email or individually. Maintaining parallelism with the web application was also considered.

Each of the schools and colleges with undergraduate programs were solicited by email for their observations and recommendations on the sections of the application that yield qualitative, rather than quantitative, information. (For example, a striking majority requested essay questions specific to their respective fields of study). The application packages of other colleges and universities through the country were examined for information about trends and best practices.

Some students in the Ann Arbor area were polled on an individual basis for general feedback on the application. Focus groups were not used because this research method yields data that is often too flawed to be useful. (For example, focus group members are observed to change their opinions based on the dynamics of the group).

 - Recommendations (if applicable)

WHAT ARE "ROLLING ADMISSIONS?"
At Michigan, we use a "modified rolling" admissions system. That means that we start reviewing an application as soon as all its components—application form, essay and short answers, official transcripts, official test scores, recommendations (if required), and the appropriate application fee—are here in our office. And when we start reviewing, we start making decisions—so the earlier you get your application in to us, the earlier you will hear from us. Once all your components are here, you can expect to hear from us in 12-14 weeks.

The feedback and information from all stakeholders was collated and compared. Current research on the graphic display of information and survey design was applied to the requested changes and to the application as a whole. The proposed changes were discussed with university counsel in order to ensure legal standing.

The revised application was presented to the management staff of OUA and was approved. It was then presented to the University Application Advisory Committee, and some of the proposed changes were revised on their advisement. The schools and colleges were then solicited again, and further changes made. Finally, the application was reviewed and approved by the Administration and the Regents of the University.

The result of this process is represented in this document. In this document, notes and changes are indicated in black ink, while the application appears in blue.

The *look* of the instructions and the application form is quite different, although the *contents* have not changed significantly. University of Michigan visual identity now appears on every page, and Office of Undergraduate contact information appears on every page where space permits.

STEP 1: Decide which "Entry Type" you are

FRESHMAN

You are a "Freshman" if you have never attended any institution of higher education following your high school graduation.

Here are the materials we need from all freshman applicants:

- Test scores: Arrange for official SAT I and/or ACT test scores to be sent to us, and other test scores if applicable, from the testing agency. Rush scores will not be accepted under any circumstances.
- If you are not a native speaker of English, arrange for your official TOEFL or MELAB scores to be sent to us from the testing agency.
- Transcripts: Arrange for official copies of your transcript to be sent to us from your high school. If you are a home-schooled student or you attend an unaccredited high school, contact the Office of Undergraduate Admissions before September of your senior year to find out if you should submit additional credentials.
- Recommendations: Request recommendations from your high school counselor and one of your teachers in an academic subject (that means math, science, history, English, or foreign language, but not fine arts, athletics, or religion). Fill out the top part of each form and give them to your counselor and teacher. You should also give your completed application to your high school counselor who will send it in to us. Your teacher can either return the completed teacher recommendation to you and you can send it in to us, or your teacher can send it in to us directly.

Preferred Admissions Program

Freshmen only. Admission to one of the following U-M third-year professional or graduate programs is guaranteed to a limited number of highly qualified freshmen who maintain a specified level of academic achievement during their undergraduate years.

If you would like to be considered for preferred admission, specify your program of choice, and provide a letter describing your reasons and career goals with your application.

TRANSFER

You are a "Transfer" if you have attended any institution of higher education (on any basis, for any length of time) following your high school graduation.

Checklist for all Schools and Colleges:

- Arrange for official copies of your transcripts from high school and all the colleges you have attended to be sent to us. If you are not a native speaker of English, arrange for your official TOEFL or MELAB scores to be sent to us from the testing agency.
- Transfer applicants do not need to provide a counselor recommendation. A recommendation from a teacher in an academic subject (math, science, history, English, or foreign language, but not fine arts, athletics, or religion) is recommended but not required.
- If you are transferring from U-M Dearborn or U-M Flint, you must fill out this application, but you do not need to pay any application fee.

CROSS-CAMPUS TRANSFER

You are a "Cross-campus transfer" if you are a current student at U-M Ann Arbor and you want to transfer from one School or College to another.

- Before filling out the application, contact the School or College you want to transfer to. They may or may not require this application.
- Deadlines vary: if the School or College you are transferring to *does* require this application, contact the Office of Undergraduate Admissions for the appropriate deadline.
- There is no application fee for cross-campus transfer applications.

RE-ADMIT

You are a "Re-admit" applicant if you are an international student with a temporary U.S. visa who has not attended classes for more than one year, and you want to re-enter the same U-M School or College you attended previously.

- There is no application fee for re-admit applicants.
- Your deadline is at least one month in advance of the start of the term for which you are applying; however, we encourage you to apply as soon as you know you want to request re-admission.

- 2** **Other names:** List any other versions of your name that may appear on your academic records, test scores, or other documents, so that we can be sure your file is complete.
- 5** **U-M ID:** If you have received mailings from us, you will find your eight-digit U-M ID number printed on the address label above your name. If you did not receive this number, just leave this section blank.
- 9** **Permanent email:** We communicate frequently with our applicants through email. If you haven't done so already, we recommend that you set up a special email account for your college applications, and check it at least twice a week until you leave for college.
- 10** **Permanent street address:** Required for all students, both U.S. and international. If you are an international student and you hold or plan to obtain an F-1 or J-1 visa, you must put a non-U.S. address in this section.
- 11** **Current U.S. street address:** If you are a U.S. student currently living elsewhere than your permanent address, put that address here. If you are an international student holding or planning to obtain an F-1 or J-1 visa, and you are currently in the U.S., put that address here. Do not put P.O. Box addresses in this space!
